B.A. EDUCATION, SOCIETY, AND HUMAN DEVELOPMENT EDUCATION FOR SOCIAL JUSTICE

The Education, Society, and Human Development major offers to any undergraduate student an introduction to issues, policies, and practices of education and research in schools, and learning across contexts.

The **Education for Social Justice** concentration prepares you to acquire a critical understanding of educational theory, research, policy, and practice from an interdisciplinary perspective across the educational pipeline (PK through Higher Education) with a focus on challenging inequality and promoting equity and social justice.
