Student Spotlight Emily Dech



Emily Dech is a second-year PhD student in the Education, Society, and Culture program. Emily's research focuses on supporting and sustaining teachers of Color by creating racial affinity spaces. Specifically, she explores how district institutionalization impacts the setup, experiences, and utility of racial affinity spaces for teachers of Color. Below, you can find insights directly from Emily about their research pursuits:

Q: What inspired you to pursue this particular area of education research?

A: As an elementary teacher, I facilitated affinity spaces for my fellow teachers of Color and witnessed firsthand how essential they were in sustaining us. This inspired me to pursue education research about racial affinity spaces for teachers of Color.

Q: What are the key findings of your work that you would like us to highlight?

A: The key findings of my work focus on how district adoption of racial affinity groups, which initially appeared to be progress for teachers of Color in the district, has commodified their labor. As a result, districts are not able to serve teachers' of Color critical needs within these affinity groups.



Q: How does your research fit into the SOE's broader equity-focused position?

A: My research centers on equity work by amplifying the counter stories of teachers of color. While affinity spaces have grassroots origins, they remain underexplored and seldom discussed within institutionalized settings.

Q: What are your professional goals?

A: My professional goal is to move back to Minnesota and teach in a teacher education program while continuing to advocate and work with local teachers of Color groups and organizations in my community.

Q: What impact on education do you hope to make throughout your career?

A: I hope to continue to contribute towards the larger conversations on supporting and retaining teachers of Color, especially amidst our current presidential administration.

Emilv's research sheds light institutionalization of racial affinity spaces for teachers of Color and examines how district adoption can hinder institutions' ability to meet teachers' critical needs. Their work underscores the importance of honoring counter stories within institutional contexts. They would like to thank Dr. Kohli for all of her help and feedback, the folx in their CRT class for creating such an enriching and safe space to explore these topics, and everyone at the research shop talk and qualitative workshop for their invaluable feedback and insight.



Faculty Spotlight Control of the Property of t

Q: What are the key findings of your work that you would like us to highlight and what are some areas of uncertainty or unanswered questions that your research has raised?

Dr. Michael Moses is an Assistant Professor in the School of Education at the University of California, Riverside. His primary research areas of focus are higher education and qualitative research methodologies. Dr. Moses uses qualitative methodologies in his work with a particular emphasis on ethnographic approaches informed by critical social theories like Critical Race Theory. As Dr. Moses has a Master's Degree in African American Studies with an emphasis in cultural and media studies, he takes an interdisciplinary approach to higher education research by using visual-elicitation and textual analysis methods to make sense of how students and scholars of color experience postsecondary settings amidst the 21st century's Information Age. Below, find Dr. Moses' personal narrative about his research and academic journey:

Q: How does your research fit within the SOE's broader, equity-focused mission?

A: More broadly, my work is focused on the experiences of students and scholars of color in the academy, the racialized implications of qualitative methodological practice, and academic writing and professional development practices. In many respects, most of my projects speak across these three interrelated areas.

Q: What is a project you are working on right now?

A: I am currently conducting a multi-year ethnography of a black doctoral student writing group and an undergraduate mentoring course. In working with both groups, discussions about their experiences as racially minoritized students regularly come up in addition to the lack of meaningful training they receive about academic writing and professional development more broadly. I first began working with the doctoral writing group as a graduate student myself, so this project has led me to meditate deeply about issues of researcher positionality and methodological ethics. In fact, I received a small grant from AERA to develop a positionality interview method vis-à-vis my work with this group. I have also received a couple of other grants to sustain the multi-year nature of the project's broader ethnography.

A: At the moment, my GSR Briana Savage, who is an ABD candidate in the SOE's higher education program, and I have found the approach to facilitation within both the doctoral student writing group and undergraduate mentoring course to be a particularly interesting finding. There seems to be a sense of humanity, humility, and "warmth" as participants have described that informs how they interact with each other. I am currently reading literature about culturally sustaining pedagogies as I sense that the field's discussion of such pedagogical approaches is somewhat exclusive to K-12 settings, so I am curious about to what extent my ethnographic site serves as not only a model to replicate but also space to theorize more humane ways of facilitating student experiences in higher education. I have much more deep thinking to do specific to this project, but I anticipate that it will culminate in a book project in years to come.

Q: What advice would you give to graduate students aspiring to pursue a career in academia as research or teaching faculty?

A: Slow down and learn the craft. We're in a weird moment in history. We are socialized to do more with less than any other point in history. However, you can't professionally do what you don't know intimately, so take your time as you learn how to read the literature, make critiques within reason, develop research questions of your own, carry out a study, and write to share your understanding of the world with others. There are no short-cuts in doing this work, so take your time, learn the craft, and trust that the process will take you to where you're destined to be in due time.

Dr. Moses is collaborating with seven SOE doctoral students on three projects and finds great joy in working with SOE students. However, he does not currently have any open graduate student researcher positions. As future opportunities arise, he looks forward to working with more SOE students on his research.
